Title: Illegal Dump Database

Issue: Continuance of the illegal dump database

Discussion

The illegal dump database is under utilized and does not currently contain enough data to be useful. Additionally, the database needs a small group of core users to identify bugs and work with MDEP to develop the desired reports, forms, and a GIS and photo interface.

The illegal dump database was approved by the DMG in 2000 with the vision that it would be useful to:

- Store data pertaining to illegal dumps within the deserts
- Prioritize dumpsites based on risks to the environment and human health and safety
- Provide spatial analysis of dumping which could then be used to target prevention and enforcement

BLM hired a contractor to enter some of its data into the database in 2002 but BLM still has many sites that are not in the database. Currently only MOJA and JOTR have entered all of their dumpsites. The database has a few bugs that need to be resolved. A complete set of forms and reports as well as a photo database and GIS interface still need development. The database will never be a useful tool without these additional developments and absent the data for which it was designed.

At the last HMWG meeting, Kern and San Bernardino Counties expressed a great interest in the database. Riverside County has expressed an interest in the past.

Options

1. Kill the database
2. Continue to keep the database as an "on hold" goal
3. Place the lead for the database with interested counties
